### **Parish Council**

The next Parish Council meeting will be a double meeting - it will be the Annual Parish Meeting where residents can bring forward any items they wish to discuss and the Annual meeting of the Council. It is scheduled for the 10<sup>th</sup> May. The Council have been made aware of a scam using the Post Office or Royal Mail asking customers via a card through the door or text message to pay a delivery fee in order to release a parcel. Please check carefully before paying any money. Citizens Advice can help you identify scams on 01728 832193 or there is lots of information on their website. A timely reminder as the weather gets better to use our beautiful footpaths with respect - clean up after your dog, stick to the path and stay out crops and please do not dump your garden waste on footpaths or in field entrances. This is fly tipping and can cause real problems for wildlife or livestock and blocks footpaths. Any problems with rights of way being blocked can be reported to Suffolk County Council's Public Rights of Way team either by email [pro.w.east@suffolk.gov.uk](mailto:pro.w.east@suffolk.gov.uk) or on the online reporting system via SCC's website.

### **Friston Allotment Association**

With the soil now warming up we can start sowing carrots, beetroot & lettuce. Lettuce are best sown in small amounts every 2 weeks to have a regular supply. Hardy annuals can also be sown outside. Half-hardy annuals need to be sown inside & planted out after frosts have finished. Mulches can now be applied to help keep in moisture & suppress weeds. Regular hoeing of bare ground will keep annual weeds under control. Feeding & dead-heading daffodils now will give a better display next year.

### **Parish Councillors Wanted**

How wonderful it isn't (sometimes) to live in a land of ostensibly orderly systematised government. At the bottom of the administrative heap are the Parish Councils of our land who find themselves responsible for the administration (and sometimes the actual doing) of things like cutting grass, unblocking drains and shoveling snow. In Friston the Parish Council deals with the village hall, the village green, village amenities like footpaths and environmental issues such as those to do with meadows, woodland, wildlife. In fact, the work of the Parish Council touches upon almost any and every aspect of life in our community. It should come as no surprise, therefore, that, under the pressures of developmental plans for the area, our Parish Council and those of our involved neighbours find themselves both under pressure and undermanned. Here in Friston, with Wind and Nuclear power initiatives set to turn the parish into a huge construction area for the next 10-12 years, the Parish Council find themselves somewhat overburdened with duties and responsibilities (some of which they didn't sign up for and which, if they could have foreseen, would have caused them to think twice about their decision to stand for office!). At the moment we have two vacancies on the parish council. So.....if you are interested in keeping your neighbours safe, sane and secure, the unique gifts you possess could be just the job in Friston *Cllr Mike Caplin (Chair Friston Parish Council)*

I have to be honest that having access to my garden, wildlife and the countryside has been so important and I consider myself very lucky living in Friston, as I'm sure many of you do too. I have chatted to people in the village that I may never have met and heard some lovely stories. Some of my favourites included a baby swift nurtured to adulthood, a cormorant in the garden pond, feisty tawny owls, leverets hiding in flower beds, roe deer and their fawns in village gardens and naughty voles! Thank you everyone for sharing your stories and wisdom. Spring is here and with it my song thrush is singing (very) loudly every morning, my hedgehog is back making short shrift of the Tesco kitten biscuits and the celandine, dog violets and red dead nettle are decorating the banks and hedgerows. I've been head butted by a few big bumblebee queens, just out of hibernation looking for a nest site, they will depend on the spring flowers and early flowering trees such as hazel and blackthorn for food. You can feed them a little sugar solution and place them in a warm sheltered spot if you find one looking a bit cold and lethargic. On a final note a lovely neighbour of mine has told me about 'PJ Cuckoo', a tagged cuckoo who returns to Suffolk every Spring.
