With the soil getting warmer we can start some early sowings of Radish & Rocket in the garden. Prune Hybrid Tea & Floribunda Roses now & give a feed of rose fertiliser. March is the last chance to plant bare-root trees & shrubs and to split & replant any overgrown perennials. Tomatoes can be sown indoors now for growing in a cold greenhouse this summer.

Friston Wildlife Watch

So winter came... I love snow, it is magical, it brings light and quiet, and sparkle when the sun shines. I saw icicles this year up to a foot long, and wonderful bulbous body-deep drifts of snow, I followed mysterious animal prints around the edges of fields and through hedges, I crunched through ice and scrunched through early morning crisped snow. I loved it, but hope that it is now gone for the year, who knows we have had snow as late as May/June before and to be honest nothing surprises me these days. March brings bird song and early spring flowers. There is a Song Thrush who sings very loudly from the top of a nearby tree every morning and evening throughout the Spring and Summer, who I was very happy to hear again this week. There are Celandines popping up in the hedgerows and I have already seen a few bees buzzing around the Mahonia. A local friend mentioned he had seen a Hare in the fields on the Sternfield road. Since moving to Friston I have seen a few of these beautiful creatures in the fields around Friston Moor and have spotted them along Mill Road and down Church Lane late at night. Last year a Friston resident had a young Hare sheltering in her garden. The best time to see Hares is first thing in the morning or early evening...I look forward to seeing more March Hare activity over the next few weeks! *Briony Sones*
