Friston Allotment Association

Pruning of apples & pears can now be carried out from now until March but not plums & cherries as they can be infected by silver leaf until frosts have finished next year.

Remove any dead or yellowing leaves from brassicas which can be carrying disease, plus stake Brussels sprouts & broccoli to prevent wind rock.

When clearing leaves etc. in the garden take care not to disturb hibernating hedgehogs, ladybirds or toads.

Check apples in store & remove any rotten ones.

Christmas trees with roots will need regular watering indoors to reduce needle drop as well as to keep them in good condition if they are to be replanted.

Friston Wildlife Watch

Don't you love a beautiful berried bush to cheer you in the winter months? When the flowering season is over, trees and plants are losing their leaves, nature rewards us with bright oranges and yellows, rich reds and shiny black berries which decorate our gardens and hedgerows. Not only are the berries a feast for the eye but also full of vitamins, minerals and anti-oxidants, all great for the wildlife or for anyone who is partial to a bit of foraging. Crab apples, hawthorn and rose hips can all be used to make jams and jellies ... apparently ... although I have to admit any preserves I consume are more likely to come from the kitchen of Mr Wilkin and his Sons (other makes are available). However, many berries are poisonous to humans, so be careful what you pick. Berries are such an important food source for birds in winter especially when the ground is frozen and they can no longer find worms, snails and insects. Rowan, yew, dogwood and honeysuckle are all native plants that produce berries - cotoneaster, berberis and pyracantha are great shrubs to plant if you want to encourage birds into your garden in the winter. Blackbirds and thrushes, robins and starlings are all attracted to the juicy fruity part of the berry whereas finches will often enjoy the seeds in the middle of the fruits. If you're lucky you may even attract some winter visitors such as redwings, fieldfares and waxwings. Apparently both holly and ivy berries have a high fat content which has the calorific value to birds which is equivalent to a chocolate bar! Happy Christmas everyone! *Briony Sones*
