With frosts still a possibility this month be prepared to protect potatoes & fruit blossom with fleece on cold nights. Squash, courgettes & runner beans can now be sown in pots to plant out at the end of May when the frosts have finished. Newly planted vegetables, trees & shrubs will require regular watering in dry spells. Tomatoes can be planted in cold greenhouses but wait until June for outside tomatoes.

We are pleased to tell you that The Revd Sarah du Boulay has been appointed Priest-in-Charge of the Alde Sandlings Benefice of which Friston is a part. She is currently assistant curate at Needham Market and is expected to take up her duties at the beginning of July. We hope that you will join in welcoming her to Friston. Our Mothering Sunday service at the end of March was very well attended and it had the added benefit of raising £425 for the Ukrainian DEC Appeal. We had a record congregation for our Easter Sunday service led by The Revd Nicky Winter with music accompaniment and hymns curated by Nicky and her husband Nick. The church looked stupendous, Margaret Fife having galvanised her flower arrangers to new creative heights. She and Margaret Savage embellished the pews and balcony with paper flowers. Thanks to Mary Pledger (glorious

pedestals), Maggie Knight (decorated font and tulips!) and Caroline Duncan (Easter Garden). It was especially memorable since at the start of the service, Nicky dedicated a scroll celebrating the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Everyone sang and Nicky's sermon was a call for Friston to rise up to the challenges which we face. ### Energy Projects

Thank you to everyone who attended the community meeting at Friston Village Hall on 7<sup>th</sup> April. It was full and an emotional occasion. Friston Parish councillors Michael Mahony and Mary Shipman are having initial meetings with Suffolk County Council and East Suffolk Council later in April. Meanwhile we have already been subject to lengthy compulsory purchase and acquisition orders affecting footpaths and individual properties without any accompanying plans for understanding. Our mood has since worsened if you observed the National Grid Sea Link webinar. This made quite clear there will be yet another interconnector on top of Nautilus and Eurolink to be dumped in our area. Public consultations (so called) are due to start in the Summer when we are also likely to be subject to meetings about the Friston projects. Happy holidays! *Simon Ive*

### Friston Wildlife Watch

Their main residence is in the Winter Jasmine on a north east wall in our garden but they also have a smaller home in our Honeysuckle, both of which, to my partner's dismay, are now terribly overgrown, but I can't possibly disturb them can I? They also like to skulk around the 'Champagne' Hebe in the rockery which I think is their favoured place for dust bathing.
