Reclaim the Rain

Friston has been chosen as one of six villages across Norfolk and Suffolk to be part of 'Reclaim the Rain', an exciting and innovative £6.4 million project funded by Defra. This project is of great importance to both counties due to the considerable flood risk and being in the most water-stressed region of the UK. Reclaim the Rain aims to look at new ways of reducing flood risk using nature-based solutions, capturing excess flood water, and putting it to good use for the community. The Project Team are keen to work with local people, to learn about their understanding of flood risk in the area and to ultimately develop tailored schemes that reflect and benefit local water users in Friston. Friston was selected for many reasons, including but not limited to, the strong local knowledge on historic flooding in the area, proactive and continued engagement with the Reclaim the Rain team, the generation of bright ideas for water reuse, and a passion for promoting sustainability in and around the village.

The Reclaim the Rain team is keen to meet, learn from, and engage with you. On Monday 21st November we'll be hosting a drop-in session in Friston Village Hall from 10am -12:00pm The team will be sharing more about the project and what we hope to achieve, listen to people's stories, answer any questions, and chat over a cup of tea/coffee and cake. We hope to meet you all soon!

Euro Link And Sea Link Interconnector Consultation

These are the sister projects to the Nautilus Interconnector project which NGV has been intermittently consulting on since 2019. Euro Link is proposed to connect the electricity grids of England and the Netherlands and Sea Link will connect Suffolk to Kent.

These are all projects which will connect to the National Grid connection hub proposed at Friston which has been misleadingly promoted as part of Scottish Power's EA1N and EA2 projects.

National Grid is promoting Sea Link under the guise of its NGET division and Euro Link under the guise of its NGV division. There has been some confusion as to how National Grid will conduct the so called consultation processes for these projects. The position now seems to be that the consultation on these projects will take place at the same time but separately.

An exhibition of the NGET Sea Link proposal will be made in Friston Village Hall on the 11th November 2022 between 1:00 pm and 8:00 pm.

There are two webinars for the proposals in Suffolk, go to nationalgrid/sealink for more details.

We appreciate everyone is feeling consultation fatigue after Sizewell C and the Scottish Power projects. However, we would urge you to attend the events so you understand these projects and express your strong opposition to yet further ill-conceived and environmentally damaging developments.

SASES Judicial Review Update

As previously reported the High Court accepted in September that SASES has an arguable case on all six of the grounds on which it is challenging the decisions of the BEIS Secretary of State to grant consent for EA1N and EA2. Those grounds relate to flood risk, heritage, noise, generating capacity, cumulative impact and consideration of alternative sites. The case will be heard in November although we do not expect judgment to be given until some weeks after the case is heard

Friston Allotment Association

Be prepared to protect brassicas from pigeons as winter approaches when their other food supplies get low. Broad Beans Aqua Dulce can be sown this month to help avoid the worst of black bean aphid attacks next spring. Hardwood cuttings can be taken over the next few months including soft fruit, some shrubs & roses. Pots & seed trays can be washed now ready for next year's crops. Check tree stakes & ties are both secure & not too tight before the winter winds & rabbit guards are in place to avoid damage in the event of heavy snowfall

Friston Wildlife Watch

Warning to all arachnophobes - spiders may be mentioned in this article

I'm actually rather fascinated by these much maligned and misunderstood creatures. In fact, I have fond childhood memories of my mother asking my father to remove spiders and my dear gentle daddy, with a twinkle in his eye, would scoop up the offending creature, give his cupped hands a little shake, lift them to his ear and then with great joy offer his prize towards us with the words "oh it's growling do you want to hear?". Before I wrote this article I admit to googling whether spiders do actually growl, they don't, but apparently some do hiss.... Living in an old house I have no choice but to share my living space with spiders of all shapes and sizes, but they are particularly prevalent in the autumn, this is because it is mating season and the males are in search of a pretty lady spider. The two most common residents are the small bodied spindly ones: the cellar or daddy long legs spider (*Pholcus phalangioedes*) which create those loose messy webs which are draped in corners and responsible for making my house look like I've decorated for Hallowe'en. Then there's the giant house spider, (*Eratigena atrica*) the big black one that you see out of the corner of your eye by the skirting board, then before you know it is charging across the floor toward you with great determination and evil intent. I admit to spending a whole evening watching a garden spider or orb weaver spider (*Eranus diadematus*) through my window, battle against the elements to build its cobweb with great care and expertise. Apart from the extraordinary fact that spider silk is 5 times the strength of steel, the orb weavers' cobwebs are a thing of extraordinary intricacy and beauty and I'm sure even the most ardent arachnophobe can't help but appreciate these spiders' webs when they are bejewelled with dew drops or frosted and glistening in the winter morning sun.
