# **Energy Projects Update**

# Scottish Power EA1N & EA2 and National Grid Connection Hub

**SASES** - SASES has been granted leave to appeal to the Court of Appeal and the hearing is scheduled for the 5 and 6 December 2023. The grounds of appeal relate to flood risk at Friston and cumulative impact. Judgement is not to be expected until a couple of months into the New Year.

**SEAS** - this case is about Scottish Power's dealings with landowners. SEAS allege that the manner of these dealings resulted in a stifled and unfair examination of EA1N & EA2. SEAS was unsuccessful in the High Court but is now seeking leave to appeal. A decision on leave is awaited.

**Sizewell C** - TASC has been granted leave to appeal to the Court of Appeal. A hearing date is yet to be fixed. The grounds of appeal relate to lack of water supply.

# Interconnector projects - Sealink, Lionlink and Nautilus

National Grid is pushing ahead with these three interconnector projects as if the JR challenges did not exist. **Sealink** - the statutory consultation for Sealink starts in October. This is a formal part of the NSIP planning process. This will be the first time we see the real details of the actual project before National Grid formally applies for planning consent. Please make sure you engage in this process. National Grid will be providing the details. Lionlink - LionLink (formerly Eurolink) National Grid has announced a supplementary 8 week public non statutory consultation for the LionLink interconnector, due to amended proposals for cable landing and corridor:

-an alternative landfall site at Walberswick & an alternative onshore underground cable corridor 'north of Southwold'. Please note the option of landfall and a cable route from the beach between Aldeburgh and Thorpeness remains. Please try to attend a local open day/exhibition (22<sup>nd</sup> & 23<sup>rd</sup> October, or 6<sup>th</sup> November) if you are able.

**Nautilus -** National Grid has been investigating the feasibility of an alternative landfall at The Isle of Grain in Medway, Kent instead of East Suffolk. No work is currently ongoing on the various East Suffolk options presented to the public in 2021 during non-statutory consultation. However a connection at Friston is being reserved as a possible option should the Isle of Grain be ruled out - decision expected by the end of 2023. Please note that this possible change of connection location is all to do with what is in the commercial interests of National Grid. It has nothing to do with the political classes despite some claims to the contrary. **Single Process** - currently we are faced with the appalling prospect that the NSIP planning process for each of these three interconnector projects will be conducted separately at different times. This will mean three sets of documents to review, three sets of representations and submissions, three sets of meetings etc. Aside from being grossly inefficient this places an unreasonable burden on the community which has already had to endure multiple NSIP processes. SASES is supporting Friston Parish Council in arguing for a single NSIP process for all three projects. This was the process adopted for EA1N, EA2 and the National Grid connection hub at Friston. Please email our district councillor Tom Daly at ESC (tom.daly@eastsuffolk.gov.uk) and our county councillor Andrew Reid at SCC (andrew.reid@suffolk.gov.uk) demanding that ESC and SCC argue strongly for a single process. **Community Benefits** - The Department for Energy Security and Net Zero is continuing with its work on community benefits and is currently holding workshops with a number of community representatives. The parish council following its and SASES consultation response is participating in this process making the points:

1. that no amount of benefits can compensate for the damage which will be done to our environment and lives if these projects go ahead;

2. community benefits need to be direct and generous if the local community is to feel less negative about these projects.

Surveying - ecological surveys are being conducted including on land near Friston.
